**SUBJECT**

**FCD Resolution No 2019-11:** A Resolution relating to the operations and finances of the King County Flood Control District; authorizing the expenditure of District funds for the projects and activities in accordance with the Flood Reduction Grants.

In its sixth year, this innovative grant program funds smaller non-CIP projects supporting local communities (cities, home owner associations, school districts, businesses, no-profits, etc.). The Flood Reduction Grant program provides grant funding for projects with flood reduction benefits, including but not limited to, surface water overflows, near shore flooding, lake flooding due to outflow blockage, or the clearance of clogged agricultural drainage systems. This year the King County Flood Control District ("District") received 36 grant requests totaling \$11,644,685. Available funding in 2019 is \$3,630,513. The review committee recommends awarding Flood Reduction Grants totaling \$3,630,160.

Grant availability was announced this spring through press releases, posting to the District website, and outreach by supervisors and their staff.

Applicants included 1 neighborhood development association, 1 town, 14 cities, 3 homeowners associations, 1 drainage district, 1 watershed improvement district, the King Conservation District, King County Water and Lands Resources Division, King County Roads Services Division, and 8 non-profits.

King County Water and Land Resources Division grants staff reviewed the projects for eligibility and visited project sites for technical review. A review panel consisting of Josh Baldi, Director of King County Water and Land Resources Division; Rich Crispo, former mayor of Newcastle; and Michelle Clark, King County Flood Control District Executive Director reviewed the grant requests and met in person to make recommendations to the District supervisors.

The review panel recommends full funding for 8 projects, the removal of 5 projects from the grant list and adding these projects to the District's 6-year

CIP (King County Water and Land Resources Division, King County Roads Services Division, Redmond, Sammamish, and Snoqualmie projects) and partial funding for 16 other projects. The review panel recommends denying 7 applications.
